NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

The Georgia Canoeing Association is extremely proud of two of its members who have received national recognition in National Championship Canoe and Kayak Races.

Former GCA President Claude Grizzard won the 1973 National Whitewater Open Canoe Championships in C-1 Open on the Lower Dead River in Maine. This is the second big win for Claude who also won the 1972 National Championship on the Wolf River in Wisconsin.

The winner of the Eastern National Wildwater Cruising Kayak Champion-ship held on the awesome Gauley River in 1973 was GCA member Dave Jones. Dave also won the Southeastern Wildwater Championships on the Nantahala in 1973.

We appreciate the dedication of Claude and Dave and the many other club members who represent us so well in this great whitewater sport. Although most of our members are not primarily interested in racing, we can all admire their commitment to excellence.

TRIP REPORTS

LITTLE RIVER, ALABAMA---FEB. 16

In spite of hard rain all Friday night, quite a large group made the drive to Alabama to run the river or to hike the trail alongside. The day was not uncomfortably cold and the rain had stopped by the time everyone gathered.

Upon advice from someone who had already climbed down the mountain to look, we, too, made the long climb down the side of the mountain to inspect the river and make a judgment before carrying the boats down. The river was up several feet above normal and into the trees at the put-in. We hiked down the trail to the first big rapid which actually appeared easier than normal for a decked boat to negotiate. But the waves above it were quite large and there were no eddies.

Anyone rounding the bend in a boat and making a quick decision on where to run would have found himself in the trees if his decision was anywhere other than down the middle. A wipe-out would mean a long swim with inherent danger to body and boat. Many more potentially dangerous rapids lie below there.

Discretion, it is said, is the better part of valor and this seemed a good time to be discreet. So we cancelled the canoe trip and separated to spend the day hiking, boating elsewhere, or sight-seeing. ---Clyde Woolsey

LITTLE RIVER CANYON, ALABAMA--FEB. 17

After hearing that the regularly scheduled club trip on the Little River was cancelled due to heavy flooded conditions, several GCA members organized a trip the following day. The river had run off somewhat and reached an ideal water level for decked boats. Unfortunately there was no gauge to provide reference for members of past and future trips. The river was still slightly out of its banks and in the trees, and there were few eddies. This made it necessary to scout all of the major rapids from the shore. Scouting was also required due to the long, fast water approaches to the rapids. The most difficult rapid on the 7-mile run is not easily recognized and leaves no room for error. Although our group felt that it could be run, we could also easily see that the slightest mistake would lead to disaster. Mainly due to the lack of sufficient throw ropes and support equipment, we all decided to carry rather than to tempt the two vicious hydraulics at the bottom of the rapid. The river was continuous with its offering of fast, heavy water with big waves and big holes. Those driving over for the fun were Dave Jones, John Mathieu and his friends Ray and Joe, Cleve Tedford, David Truran, and Mark Warren. Connie Gibson hiked the trail along the river and caught the action on film. --- Cleve Tedford

MARCH TRIPS

SATURDAY, MARCH 2

CHESTATEE RIVER (Class III)

The Chestatee is a beautiful river and offers some Class III rapids, one which is approximately 100 yards long and must be run. Some experience is essential. The trip takes about four hours. Come prepared for cold weather with wetsuit or change of clothing in a waterproof bag.

SUNDAY, MARCH 3

ALCOVY RIVER (Class I)

This is a fine family trip if we have warm weather. The rapids are a pleasant Class I, although there is a Class III section beyond our proposed take-out point. The float should take around five hours. Bring lunch, life-jackets and appropriate clothing---wet suits are not necessary.

TELLICO AND OBED RIVERS, MARCH 9-10

The Tellico River below Bald River Falls at 700-2000 c.f.s. is a decked boater's Nantahala. For seven miles it offers almost continuous Class III rapids with a couple that might be called Class IV at the appropriate water levels. This is not a river for beginners and only expert open canoeists and proficient decked boaters should attempt it.

The Obed system on the Cumberland Plateau in East Tennessee offers some of the most challenging whitewater in the Eastern United States. If the water level is adequate, we will select one of many Class III-IV runs for our trip on Sunday. Again, this is not a trip for beginners. Pre-registration with trip leader required. The trip may be cancelled due to low water conditions. Those planning to run on Sunday should plan on driving back 260 miles with no stops for gas.

SATURDAY, MARCH 16

NACOOCHEE STRETCH OF THE CHATTAHOOCHEE (Class I-II)

This section of the river is ideal for canoeists of intermediate skill. In warm summer weather, it is a good run for the beginner of some river experience to practice on if he has a skilled partner. It is expecially swift in the spring, however, so one must definitely have maneuvering capability to avoid being swept into logs that lie against the bank on river bends or just out in a low overhang from sand bars. It's a challenging stream, with frequent Class I and II rapids and with its own special, seasonal charm no matter when it is run.

SUNDAY, MARCH 17

UPPER CHATTAHOOCHEE (Class I-III)

This section from Georgia 255 to Duncan Bridge Road near View offers many Class I to III rapids. Smith Island, Buck Shoals, Three Ledges, Horse Shoe and many others will present a challenge to maneuvering skills of even the expert canoeist at the higher water levels.

Wet suits will be the preferred attire. A waterproof bag containing sufficient changes of clothing may be acceptable if the temperature and wind are moderate. We rescued two rafters on this section last April that were nearly demobilized from hyper-thermia (loss of heat). It pays to be well prepared. Bring a hot lunch if practical.

MEET: At the put-in on Ga. 255 at 9:30 a.m. We will try to leave a shuttle car at the take-out on the way up.

SATURDAY, MARCH 23

ETOWAH RIVER

The Etowah is a pleasant little river south of Dahlonega, full of Indian history and gold diggings. Come for a Saturday outing, but be prepared for cold weather, especially around the feet because there is a portage around an 8-foot waterfall. This is a beginner river, but some experience in the canoe is very nice, especially since the water will be cold (in case of an upset). Brown's Guide to Georgia, Volume 1, Number 3 (Summer, 1973) has a very inviting article on the Etowah written by Dr. Claude Terry.
