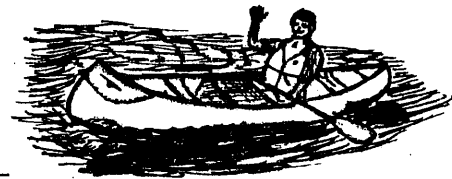

TRIP REPORTS

Upper Chattahoochee, Sunday, Feb. 16

After hearing a forecast of "rain all day" and driving a hundred miles in a downpour, I didn't really expect too much. But to my surprise almost everyone showed up, and luck was with us. It stopped raining just before we put in at SR 255, and we had sun by lunch time.

The water was fast and heavy. The top of the gauge was under water but it would have read 3.5 if it had been extended. The high water covered all the rocks at Smith Island, making it a straight run through big waves. The two tandem canoes took out at SR 115. Buck Shoals had some really big waves and even some of the usually insignificant "ripples" surprised us with high waves and big holes. While discussing the names of rapids at our usual right bank lunch stop below Buck Shoals, one of the kayakers, running the Upper Chattahoochee for the first time, was really surprised when he learned that the series of 4-ft. waves we had just bounced through was "nothing" and that it was just a small 1-ft. ledge at normal levels. Three-foot Ledge was probably the best fun spot with its huge waves. Rub Board was easy--it was completely covered over. We all ran the Horseshoe on the left as usual. (Dale Bergen even ran it broadside with no trouble on his second run.) However, there was plenty enough water to run the Horseshoe "over the ledge" on the right. The total time for this trip was three hours.

The participants of this really great trip were: Dale Bergen, Herb Henry and Allen Lewis in C-1 open; AC and Ace Marshall, Bill Girard and friend in C-2 open; Randy Christian, Jim Barrows and Gwen Bergen in K-1. Allen Lewis.

Cartecay, Sunday, March 2

Thirteen boats showed up on a cold, snowy day to run the Cartecay. Two tandem open boats wisely decided not to run the river, for they did not have cold weather gear. Three kayaks that started out, turned back after 1/2 mile, but the hardy(?) eight others kept on. The river gauge read 2.5, so it was a very nice level for open and decked boats.

Snow fell all day but none was sticking on the ground. However, there were a few icy-looking paddlers by the end of the trip. It was a cold, beautiful winter day which everyone enjoyed immensely (at least after we finally got warm). On the trip were: Dale Bergen, Tom Carter and Tom Pope in C-1 opens; Gwen Bergen, Stuart Alston, Walter Evans and Robin Oscar in K-1s; and Murray Johnson and Falma Moye in C-2 decked. Falma Moye.

Flint, Saturday, March 8

We put in at Sprewell Bluff at 10:30 on a cool but sunny morning. The river was medium high (gauge at 8.8) and the water was fast. We had lunch at SR 36 bridge at 12 noon. Yellow Jacket Shoals surprised everyone -- including the trip leader. Instead of a series of shallow ledges which can be expected at lower levels, we washed down a 600-yard long rapid. Yellow Jacket sluice, a 5 ft. ledge at the end of this rapid, successfully swamped 8 out of the 11 boats. Many thanks to the fishermen who had a fire built on the left bank. We took out at Pobiddy Road at 4 o'clock.

The river is at an ideal level and I would like to run it a few more times before the water level drops in May. Anyone for an impromptu trip?

#### EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETINGS

We were pleased to have a handful of members join the Board at its February meeting. Major items on the agenda were: 1) the beginning of up-dating our Bylaws; 2) agreeing to support the April 19 races at Helen, Georgia; and 3) a report from Dave Garrity to the effect that Green, Buckley, DeRieux and Jones have completed their study of the public's right to use the rivers of Georgia and that the results had been given to the Department of Natural Resources. (A separate report on the River Rights Defense Fund appears in this newsletter.)

The March 5 meeting was devoted to completion of the Bylaw revisions so that the new Bylaws could accompany our application for a Tax I.D. number, which had to be submitted before March 12. Revisions were governed by two factors: 1) In ignorance of the Bylaws, the club had been violating some of its Articles. Accordingly, such Articles were changed to correspond with what has become accepted practice. 2) Certain Bylaw Articles were in extreme conflict with the Articles of Incorporation, established June 28, 1972, and so were revised to conform with the Incorporation Charter. These Bylaws are appended herewith.

The Executive Board will request a vote of confidence from the membership regarding these March 1975 Bylaws. If there are serious objections to any area they may be revised by majority vote if not in conflict with the Charter. We appreciated the attendance of non-Board members at this Bylaw meeting; their input was important.

The next Board meeting will be held on April 2 in Classroom 1, Fernbank Science Center, 7:30 p.m. All members are cordially invited to attend.

**BYLAWS OF THE  
GEORGIA CANOEING ASSOCIATION, INC.**

**ARTICLE I: NAME**

The name of this club shall be the Georgia Canoeing Association, Inc. Said club may be affiliated with other organizations of similar interests and other conservation-interested organizations.

**ARTICLE II: OBJECTS**

Encourage the exploration, enjoyment, and preservation of American recreational waterways for man-powered craft; protect the wilderness character of waterways through conservation of water, forests, parks, wildlife and related resources;

Promote safety and proficiency in all aspects of white water activities such as the navigation of moving water, teaching, teamwork, racing, leadership and equipment design by publishing and demonstrating developments in these and related fields; promote appreciation for the recreational value of wilderness cruising and of white water sports. Chart and preserve canoeable streams in and around the State of Georgia.

**ARTICLE III: BASIC POLICIES**

Section I: The objects of safe canoeing shall be promoted through an educational program directed toward members, their families and interested guests.

Section II: This Association shall be non-commercial. The name of the Association or the names of any members in their official capacity shall not be used without the specific consent of the Executive Board.

Section III: This organization may affiliate and cooperate with other organizations and agencies active in aquatic and outdoor activities, such as conference groups and coordinating councils, provided its representative makes no commitments that bind the group he represents, except as directed by the Executive Board. These organizations are to be listed in the annual Guide Book.

**ARTICLE IV: MEMBERSHIP AND DUES**

Section I: Any person eighteen years or older, who is a competent swimmer, interested in the objects of the Georgia Canoeing Association, Inc., who is willing to uphold its policies and subscribe to its Bylaws may become a member upon payment of dues as hereinafter provided.

Section II: The annual dues shall be all inclusive for membership in the Georgia Canoeing Association, Inc., and shall be established at a general meeting by majority vote of members present after it has been announced by letter or in the Newsletter. The dues may be for an Individual Member or for a Family unit.

tion fee immediately upon receipt of the bill therefor in September. It shall be the Treasurer's duty to make inquiry therefor if such bill has not reached him by mid-September.

Section V: The Newsletter Editor shall be responsible for: (1) editing the contributions to the Newsletter; (2) for arranging for the typing and distribution of the Newsletter; (3) for getting the material to the printer in time for it to be mailed and into the membership's home for registration for the first trip of the month.

Section VI: The Cruisemaster shall be responsible either working alone or as the head of a committee for securing leaders for all trips scheduled by the Executive Board. The Cruisemaster shall further be responsible for distributing and collecting safety equipment to and from such leaders.

Section VII: The Training Director shall be responsible for organizing and conducting such training and instructional courses as shall be deemed appropriate.

**ARTICLE VII: MEETING**

Meetings of the membership shall be held at the discretion of the Executive Board; provided that there be at least two meetings per year, the time and place to be determined by the President. The final meeting of the year shall be a combined dinner and business meeting to elect officers for the coming year.

**ARTICLE VIII: EXECUTIVE BOARD**

Section I: The Executive Board shall consist of the officers of the Association, the immediate past President and any chairmen appointed by the President, such chairmen to be voting members of the Board.

Section II: The duties of the Executive Board shall be to draw up a tentative schedule of river trips for the year, and transact necessary business between club meetings. A majority shall constitute a quorum.

Section III: The Executive Board normally shall meet once a month; although the President may call special meetings or cancel regularly scheduled meetings as may be come necessary.

**ARTICLE IX: AMENDMENTS**

Section I: The Executive Board shall have power at any time, and from time to time, to make, alter, amend and repeal bylaws for the administration and regulation of the affairs of the Association.

This amount shall be paid to the Treasurer on or before February First of each year to be included in membership listing in the annual Guide Book. Upon joining, the application for membership shall be completed by the signing of a printed release of injury responsibility to the Association member or guest.

**ARTICLE V: OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION**

Section I: The Officers of the Association shall be the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor, Training Director and two Members-at-Large for the Executive Board. These officers shall be elected annually by ballot; provided however, that if there shall be but one candidate for any office, by motion from the floor, the election may be by voice. Officers shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected and installed. No officer shall be eligible for the same office for more than two complete consecutive terms with the exception of the Treasurer and the Training Director who may serve longer for the sake of continuity. Terms of office shall run from November 1 to October 31.

Section II: Nominations may be made only with the prior consent of the nominee.

Section III: A vacancy occurring in an elected office shall be filled by vote at the next regularly scheduled meeting or by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Executive Board present at the Executive Board meeting.

**ARTICLE VI: DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section I: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association, shall be Chairman of the Executive Board, shall appoint all committee chairmen, shall be Chairman of the Executive Board, shall appoint all committee chairmen, shall be a member ex officio of all committees and shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to the office. The President shall be the club representative to any affiliated organizations. Any fees necessary for the President's membership in such affiliated organizations shall be paid for by the Georgia Canoeing Association.

Section II: The Vice President shall act as an aid to the President, presiding in the absence of that officer, and shall be responsible for maintaining an inventory of club equipment, including places of storage.

Section III: The Secretary shall keep a correct record of all general meetings and all meetings of the Executive Board.

Section IV: The Treasurer shall receive all monies and keep an accurate record of all receipts and expenditures and shall pay out of local funds only as authorized by the Executive Board. The Treasurer may delegate authority to another member of the club to handle all monies received and expended with regard to a special project, activity or fund.

The Treasurer shall file an annual income tax return for the fiscal year in which he held office in the Association. The Treasurer shall pay the State incorpora-

**ARTICLE X: VOTING**

Those entitled to vote shall be members in good standing whose dues are paid current. Individual members shall have one (1) vote and Family units shall have one (1) vote.

**ARTICLE XI: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY**

Roberts Rules of Order Revised shall govern this Association in all cases to which they are applicable.

TRAINING SESSION APRIL 26-27

The first training session for 1975 will be for tandem open boats only. This session is designed to teach beginning canoeists on Class I and II rivers. The course will emphasize safety, equipment, and proper execution of strokes and maneuvers. Participants will be expected to paddle vigorously for two days (practicing all strokes and maneuvers and running rapids in different ways).

The session will be limited to the first 15 boats that register. Preference will be given to GCA members. Non-members may submit dues with the registration fee. Registrants can expect close supervision and instruction, as there will be a 1:3 teacher to student ratio. The course will include a short classroom session, lake paddling to learn strokes, and instruction on two rivers.

Fee for the course is \$10/person. A copy of McNair's Basic River Canoeing text will be available to participants at cost. Applicants will be contacted with details concerning equipment, times, etc.

Persons who are interested but do not have a partner should sign up. We will try to pair you with another. See reverse side for registration form. (Teams should use the same form.)

There will be additional training sessions for solo paddlers, intermediate tandem teams, and decked boaters, etc.

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RIVER RIGHTS DEFENSE FUND REPORT

Thus far, \$2,987.90 has been collected for the River Rights Defense Fund, which is to be used for necessary legal expenses involved in our continuing effort to insure that our rights to utilize canoeable streams will not be violated. Dot Stephenson has graciously agreed to serve as treasurer for this separate GCA account in order to reduce the workload which has been imposed on the GCA's treasurer.

Progress has been made, albeit slowly. Our counsel, Green, Buckley, DeRieux and Jones, have been working closely with attorneys for the State Department of Natural Resources. While our attorneys have been primarily involved in legal research involving disposition of this issue in other states, the DNR attorneys have been researching Georgia statutes and court cases, including English Common Law, in search of precedents. Both counsels agree that a good case has been developed. DNR has had numerous conversations with the staff in the Attorney General's office; however, a ruling has not yet been requested. DNR informs us that other priorities have prevented them from finalizing the case and seeking an opinion from the State Attorney General. The DNR Board has now set April 15, 1975 as the deadline for submitting this case to the Attorney General. Meanwhile, members are urged to make every effort to improve their relations with residents of the North Georgia area.

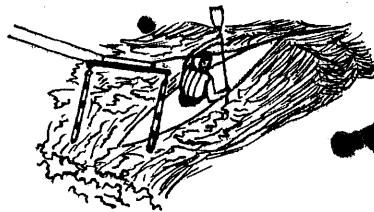

WET & COLD: WATCH OUT!

Winter and Spring canoeing can be loads of fun, but it can also cause serious problems if the boater is not well prepared. There are four factors which you must be ready for: 1) Cold (not necessarily extreme); 2) Wind; 3) Wetness (no one plans to turn over); 4) A likely victim (out of shape, or poorly dressed)

Being prepared for any or all of these eventualities is a necessity in winter canoeing. Start warm and be ready to stay warm.

1. If the water temperature and air temperature are less than 100° combined, wear a wetsuit.  
T° Air (42°) + T° Water (38°) = 80°: WETSUIT.
2. Wear a hat. An unprotected head can lose up to 1/2 the body's total heat production at 40° F. Stocking hats are fine and fit under most helmets.  
Wear wool. Even when wet, wool provides some warmth. Down, cotton, and most synthetics get wet, stay wet, and keep you cold. Wool sweaters and wool socks are a must.
4. Take extra dry clothes. One dry change per person is ideal; however, at least one dry sweater is a necessity.
5. Waterproof matches and fire starter. Keep the matches in a water-proof wrapping on your person.
6. Extra food and some warm food. A thermos of warm soup or a small backpacker stove does not add much extra weight. Warm liquids are an excellent way to warm a chilled person.

This may sound like a lot of extra gear, but it can be divided among boats. If you dump, try to get out of the water fast. Immersion for any length of time will drain a person of body heat very rapidly; water can extract heat from the body 24 times faster than air. A person who is chilled should be warmed as quickly as possible for he will continue to lose body heat until serious problems arise. The victim should be changed into dry clothes and given warm liquids to drink.

Don't let cold weather keep you off a river, but don't let the cold ruin your river day. Be prepared and enjoy canoeing all year round. Palma Moye
