## JUDGE LOGGINS RENDERS DECISION

Judge Loggins of Chattooga County has rendered a decision against the GCA and Benny Young in the hearing for Interlocutory Injunction in our continuing effort to clarify the right of passage in the State of Georgia. Now, basically what this means is that we asked the court to grant us the right to paddle through landowner Ralph Henry's property on a temporary basis until the actual trial which was scheduled for August. The Judge heard over 4 hours of testimony on April 15th and after over 2 months of deliberation, decided that the Armuche Creek is not a river which is paddleable in small craft such as canoes even though a canoe rental service has operated there for over 6 years, and that many, many people, including yours truly, have paddled the river in the past. We now have 3 options. Option 1 is to go ahead with the trial. Option 2 is to appeal this decision at

the State Supreme Court level, where we hope to win. Or option 3 which is to walk away and look for another river with a similar situation. Right now our lawyers are definitely leaning toward option 2 as we feel that we have more than enough case law and support to have Loggins decision reversed at the Supreme Court level.

I want to make it clear to everyone that we have not lost any rights or had a precedent case ruled against us at this point. We have simply been restrained from paddling through about 3 hundred yards of one landowners cow pasture on one flatwater creek.

However, we must abide by this ruling and not paddle through this area. If you are in doubt and want to paddle the rest of Armuche Creek, contact Twin Oaks canoe rental when you are in the area of Armuche Creek which is about 1 mile upstream of Henry's property, and they will tell you exactly where we

are prohibited from paddling for the time being.

### WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE

The GCA Board will almost certainly vote to appeal this decision at the State Supreme Court level. This appeal must be filed by July 19th and will be placed in a long line of cases to be heard on a future docket. At this time a date would only be a wild guess. We also have assurance that the State of Georgia will file an Amicus Brief on behalf of the public supporting our position that there is a right of common passage on the streams of Georgia.

### DON'T PANIC

Hang in there folks. This is only a minor setback in our overall goal to clarify the right to paddle in Georgia. We have the support of the State Government and the case law history to ultimately achieve our main objective.

## NANTAHALA

On June 22, 1991, the club had a manageable size Nanty trip. This is unusual considering the time of year and that the week before approximately 30 people showed up at the put-in. Maybe the coordinator needs to check his personal hygiene? Anyway, the day started well, hot, sunny, and relatively high water (3.5+). The shuttle was run by Barry Hahn, Tim Kaylor, and yours truly before the scheduled meeting time. The first dilemma encountered not covered in the trip coordinator's course was what to do when people show up after you've stuffed the little permit slip through the appropriate slot. Consensus was to alter the original document changing the 6 to 9, and suggesting that the ranger stand on his head to read the number of boaters in the group. Francis and Julie ran perpetual sweep until Barry assumed the role (no pun intended) at the falls where he put on a brief demonstration of side-surfing in the top hole. ## CHATTOOGA WETLANDS THREATENED

US Rep Charles Taylor has introduced a bill in the House to release the Overflow Wilderness Study area, which includes Blue Valley near Highlands, from its designation as a study area.

If the bill passes Congress, it means the old-growth forests in Blue Valley could be subject to clearcutting by the US Forest Service in the future. The North Carolina Wilderness Act of 1984 designated the Overflow area, along with many other state tracts, as wilderness study areas. But a 1987 Forest Service study recommended that the Overflow area in Macon county be released from that designation which prevents logging, construction of roads, and use motorized equipment in the area. Local independent

foresters say that logging roads and clearcutting would forever destroy the integrity of the forest and stream habitats for wildlife and fish which include black bears, barred owls and the rare warbler.

Paddlers know the area best for Overflow Creek, a class 4-5+ run, but this area is also the headwaters for the West Fork of the Chattooga.

Write declaring your opposition to this bill and recommending that Blue Valley be designated a permanent wilderness area to Congressman Charles Taylor, US House of Representatives, Washington D.C. 20515.

**CALICO CUPBOARD:** off the square in Ellijay, Ga.- Excellent for breakfast at reasonable prices and dinner which includes entree and 3 home grown veggies or 2 and cobbler for \$3.99. Not fancy, but some of the best reasonable food and friendly service. (Near the Cartecay, enroute to the Nantahala and Ocoee.) Hours are from 7-4. 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## CARTECAY CLEAN-UP

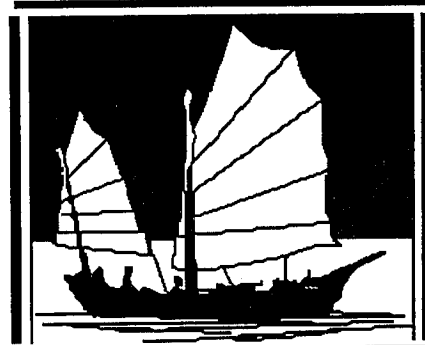

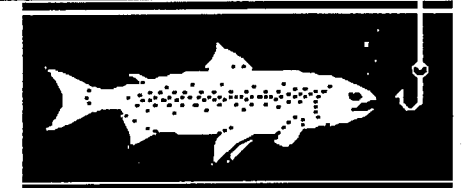
