Changes Coming to *The Eddy Line* by Rick Bellows

At its March 5 meeting, the GCA Board of Directors decided to make some fundamental changes to *The Eddy Line*. The changes will directly affect both the frequency and the content of the newsletter. Indirectly, the changes will result in the naming of a new editor.

In order to save on printing and mailing costs, the Board decided *The Eddy Line* is to become a bi-monthly newsletter. Allen Hedden, who was designated to inform me of the Board's decision, tells me the expectation is that the June issue will be followed by a July/August issue and bi-monthly issues thereafter.

The Board also decided to change the content of *The Eddy Line*, removing the time-sensitive information such as the trip list, announcements of upcoming events and minutes of meetings. That information will be available only via the GCA groupmail or the web site.

The content of *The Eddy Line* is to be "entertaining and educational." Allen tells me the Board intends that to mean trip reports and articles from other newsletters and similar sources, though he also suggested it would leave room for articles on conservation and access issues and for editorials.

I have, for want of a better phrase, serious philosophical differences with the Board as to the purpose and the appropriate content of *The Eddy Line*. I have therefore notified the Board that the June issue will be my last as Editor. (If you are interested in taking over the position, I guess you need to contact Tom Bishop, whose contact information is on page 2.)

This issue of *The Eddy Line* includes three items generated by the changes. Tom Bishop's "From the President" column beginning on page 8 explains the Board's rationale for the changes. I reluctantly edited the piece for length, but made every effort not to change its substance.

An article by William Gatling on page 10 suggests now may be the time to discontinue *The Eddy Line* entirely. Perhaps even more importantly, it seeks to generate some discussion of the Board's decision.


And finally, my short editorial, also on page 10, asks some questions about the effect of the changes on GCA members.

KEY TO GCA SKILL LEVELS

Flat Water - no current will be encountered; safe for new paddlers.

Beginner - mild current, occasional Class 1 ripples; new paddlers can learn basic river techniques.

Trained Beginner - moving water with Class 1-2 rapids; basic strokes and bracing skills needed.

Intermediate - rapids up to Class 3; eddying and ferrying skills needed; kayakers need solid roll.

Advanced - rapids up to Class 4; excellent boat control and self-rescue skills required.

Signing Up: Call the trip coordinator listed to sign up for trips. Most trip coordinators will move a trip to an alternate venue if the water levels and conditions for a particular trip are not favorable. Call early in the week to ensure you get a spot on the trip, and in consideration for the coordinators, PLEASE avoid calling late in the evening.

Training Trips are a combination of recreation and training designed for those boaters who have completed a formal training clinic and would like some on-the-river time with instructors practicing what was learned in the clinic and expanding skill levels. **Canoe Camping Trips** are multi-day trips, generally on flat or mild water, with at least one night of camping. For details on a scheduled trip, call the trip coordinator. To arrange a trip, call Vincent Payne at 770.834.8263.

To Volunteer To Lead Trips: Call Cruisemaster William Gatling at 770.529.7103. As usual, we need trip coordinators for all types of trips, from flatwater to Class 5 whitewater. The Association saw a net decrease of assets in February 2009 of \$467.82 on revenues of \$1.011.77.

Ed has filed the association's income tax return for 2008 showing net assets of \$65,090.00 for the 2008 tax year.

Ed stated the expenses for hardcopy printing and mailing of the Eddy Line are currently averaging \$1,000.00 per month.

A general discussion ensued regarding the continuing costs associated with hardcopy printing of *The Eddy Line*. Allen Hedden moved to change distribution of printed copies of *The Eddy Line* to a bi-monthly printing and mailing with the editor having discretion for the date of publication. And further, that the general content of *The Eddy Line* be changed to reflect a more educational and entertainment focus. Finally, that time sensitive and repetitive information no longer be published in *The Eddy Line*, but rather, be posted in a timely manner on GCA's website. All administrative and logistical procedures to accomplish the above will be vested in and be established by the editor.

Motion was seconded and approved.

Member Services (Chair Kate Wilkerson)

Kate reiterated prior information regarding GCA having officially become an ACA Paddle America Club and now able to participate with ACA insurance policies.

Recreation (Chair Mark Holmberg)

Resource Development (Chair William Gatling)

Legal (Chair Dan MacIntyre)

Dan reported that GCA currently has 75 members participating in GEAN.

OLD BUSINESS:

No old business presented.

NEW BUSINESS:

Southeasterns

Although she was not present, Gina provided the Board with a written statement indicating her opinion that due to an apparent lack of interest among the paddling community, the Southeasterns event last year was poorly attended, lacked sufficient volunteer support to adequately staff the races, and was potentially dangerous. Gina consequently felt that GCA should withdraw its sponsorship of the event.

A general discussion followed regarding the feasibility of GCA continuing to sponsor the Southeastern Races. General sentiment appeared to be that while the Southeasterns may not be potentially dangerous, that GCA should continue sponsorship only if high caliber racers choose to participate and volunteers sufficient to adequately staff the races also participate.

Allen Hedden moved that GCA withdraw its sponsorship of the slalom portion of its Southeastern U.S. Slalom & Wildwater Championships this year. Motion seconded and approved by a vote of 6 ayes and 2 nays.

The Board agreed to request John Pinyerd be asked to coordinate the holding of the 41st Annual Southeastern U.S. Wildwater Championships on the Nantahala this year at a date to be determined.

President Bishop and the members present noted that they had no objection to another organization, such as the NOC or other paddling clubs, organizing the slalom portion of the Southeasterns this year.

Back to the Chattahoochee River Race & Festival

Tammy Morrisey, representing the Chattahoochee River Keepers, submitted a request that GCA again support the annual Back to the Hooch River Race by providing a committee to conduct timing of the races as was provided for last year's event.

The Board committed to provide the requested timing volunteers. Lamar Phillips committed to obtain a chairperson and marshal the requested group of volunteers.

From The Trash Queen 'Hooch, Soque Clean-Ups Planned

Happy Spring all you Georgia Paddlers!

Getting to be that time of year when all good Georgia paddlers start thinking about their favorite river and that perfect day on it. While you are putting together your trip schedule, please allow one day this season for a clean-up.

With the low water levels of the last couple of years, then the sudden monsoonal rains we have had, much trash just laying around has made its way to the river. I had to cancel 2 clean-ups scheduled myself last year because there was not enough water to paddle, so it has been a while since many rivers and river sections have been cleaned up.

I have the following clean ups scheduled:

Chattahooche River

May 2 - Section 1 - Sautee Creek to Highway 255 Bridge; May 10 - Section 4 - Highway 384 (Duncan Bridge) to Mossy Creek;

June 7 - Garrard's Landing to Azalea Drive - Clean the Course:

July 18 - Belton Bridge to Lula Bridge (Lake Lanier);

August 2 - Section 2 - Highway 255 Bridge to Highway 115 Bridge;

August 9 - Section 3 - Highway 115 Bridge to Duncan Bridge (Highway 384)..

Soque

July 26 - Old Cannon Bridge to Duncan Bridge

Since I work part time for Upper Chattahoochee Riverkeeper, they are on the Chattahoochee and tributaries. If you want to join me, I will have dates, times and additional information on the website.

I really need other paddlers who want to lead a trash trip and put it on the website schedule. The GCA has adopted a section of the Chattooga for clean-up so we need someone to take the Thrifts Ferry to Bull Sluice portion Section 3 and lead a trip.

Another place screaming out for a clean-up is the Coosowattee along the Paddle Georgia Day One schedule. I hate for visitors to see this trash.

Here are a couple of tips if you decide to schedule and lead a clean up:

- * Take a small section of less then 5 miles so you don't overload yourself and burn out your helpers
- * Figure out how to handle the trash once you get it to the takeout. Many counties and cities, NPS, even some outfitters

will be more then happy to help you dispose of the trash, you just need to ask BEFORE you start. If you do this on a whim and end up with a bunch of trash, please make sure you get rid of it properly, or you become part of the problem.



CONSERVATION

* Trash sticks with the grabbers work great. Just FYI, they sink, so make

sure you attach a small piece of a noodle to them so they float. I have a UCR supply of these sticks, and will lend them out of you need them. You can also stick them into areas you can't see BEFORE you stick your hands in.

- * GO SLOW, make sure your group stays together and help even out the trash. Canoes are wonderful! Nothing like a good garbage barge. Have everyone sign a wavier.
- * Some things are better left alone. Very large, heavy items are many times just too big to move. Safety first. Many of the objects that should be left like tires are holding the bank up or anchoring the sand. Moving these objects will just destabilize the bank and cause more erosion.
- * Try and get rid of water in objects you pick up. Water and dirt are heavy. Mesh bags work great.
 - * HAVE FUN! Getting wet and dirty is part of the deal, so continued on following page

Good News and Bad News From American Rivers

The good news is that, on March 25, Congress passed the most comprehensive river protection and public lands bill in decades, securing permanent protection for 1,100 miles of rivers in eight states and 350,000 acres of land along 86 new Wild and Scenic Rivers.

None of the rivers are in Georgia or the Southeast. Two of the rivers are in Vermont and one in Massachusettes - the rest are in the West.

The bad news is that Georgia's Flint River is #2 on

American Rivers' 2009 list of America's Most Endangered Rivers. The threat to the Flint, one of the few rivers in the Southeast that still flows unimpeded for more than 200 miles, is a new proposal for two dams.

The proposal is not new, but has been dusted off as the drought has spurred a search for new water supplies for Metro Atlanta. The 2008 General Assembly passed a bill to encourage the construction of new water supply reservoirs, and a November study of potential sites recommended the two new reservoirs on the Flint as well as expansion of current reservoirs on its tributaries.

From the President The Eddy Line Will Be Published Bimonthly: Why?

While the rain drought might finally be ending, it seems that everyone is strapped for cash these days. At the GCA we also have long-standing financial issues - a cash drought if you will.

Month after month the club's cash accounts slowly but surely leak away. We are in a situation now where we will run out of working capital in a few months time, if we keep spending the same amounts. It is a very simple calculus; more money out, less money in, will mean zero money to operate the club in the very near future.

Month after month the single biggest line item on our budget is *The Eddy Line*, our venerable newsletter. We spend around \$1000+ for printing and mailing costs every month. Unfortunately, we don't take in enough money to cover that cost, even with the recent rise in dues, and with quite a few of us receiving the electronic version only, and voluntarily forgoing our right to the printed version. We are simply running out of funds.

Let me repeat that: many GCA members take only the electronic version, and we have not missed out on paddling trips, timely information, or club activities. We have a new and evolving website created by Matthew Crawford that members can go to and get information about upcoming paddling trips, timely information, or club activities.

This new website is not a static brochure, but a living document of the club where members can get timely information, post stories, photos, and video and connect with the other members of club. Check it out and plan to stay for a while. It's a big place, it is our presence on the web, and I am proud of it.

At the board March board meeting the question of what we are going to do about our financial state again came up. A proposal was made and approved by the board for the club to publish *The Eddy Line* on a bimonthly basis. We also decided to de-emphasize time-sensitive announcements, meeting minutes and repetitive information, which can be announced on the website, and go to more entertaining, educational content.

We are making this change to improve *The Eddy Line*. Our printed newsletter is a document that can last for years. Printing the minutiae of daily operations quickly makes it stale, while putting in information that has no time limit will keep it fresh so that someone picking up *The Eddy Line* a year later will find it interesting.

When I get the electronic *Eddy Line*, I glance at the trip list, go skip the next 5 or 6 pages of information that we repeat month after month, and go directly to the small bit of room that is left for trip reports, educational articles and stories about my fellow club members, and whatever lunatic ideas and adventures they come up with. That is what the club is about.

Never once has someone come to me and said, "Boy, those meeting minutes were sure an interesting read. We should have more of that!" (sorry Bill) or "Wow! That financial report had me on the edge of my seat!" (apologies Ed). But I have had many conversations about the varied and interesting articles that have been published in *The Eddy Line*, from the incoherent musings of Vincent Payne to the fantastical fiction of Debra Berry and the reports of exciting Wildwater

success from John Pinyard, as well as all of the trip reports that members have contributed over the years; that is what makes *The Eddy Line*.

The idea is to make *The Eddy Line* a more readable, interesting, and in general a better newsletter that is more representative of the interests of our club. Something we can point to and say "Yeah, my club published that, and I'm proud of it."

Certainly some of you will not like this decision. The one thing I can count on as President is that there is always someone willing to criticize, someone willing to rant, someone willing to be outraged, someone willing to quit. The board will be accused of being out of touch, lazy, negligent, and not addressing the real problem. If you wish to have input then attend the meetings.

Most anyone can rip out a one-sided email and complain. It is much harder to make a positive contribution. Please remember that we are all volunteers here, we are all genuinely concerned, none of us particularly want to go bi-monthly, and we are forced to take this action out of necessity.

Last time I looked, printers want to be paid, and the post office does not deliver on credit. Print media of all kinds are reducing their size, cutting staff, and disappearing from the publishing landscape. We are not immune to this trend.


It is time for *The Eddy Line* to stop publication. It was the crown jewel of the GCA for years, but time has passed it by.

The most incredible feature of the website is one that you would never notice until you use it. That is the ability to search for old content. Well written articles go into *The Eddy Line* to be read once and die. An article posted on-line can be recalled when ever information from it is needed.

I loved *The Eddy Line*, but if it can't live with dignity then it is time to let it go!

Saturday, March 28 Upper, Upper Chattahoochee

This GCA trip was scheduled to be a two-day camping safari to the Tennessee Smokies to paddle Little River and Abrams Creek. However, when several folks backed out at the last minute and we feared that we might have too much water in the Smokies, we moved the trip to North Georgia to take advantage of recent heavy rains.

On Saturday open boaters Kevin McInturff and I and kayakers Jay Manalo and Alex Edl met at 1:30 p.m. at Robertstown. The Helen gauge was at 1.8, so we shuttled north on FS52 to paddle one of my most favorite runs.

We slid our boats down the mountain along a ridge 100 feet past the gated north end of FS52B. Using very long painters and belaying off trees, we got to the river in about 15

minutes.

From our put-in the Chattahoochee drops at a rate of ninety feet per mile for just over four miles, through nearly continuous Class 2 and 3 shoals and a most delightful natural slalom course. The level was low but passable for the first mile and a third to Jasus Creek, but nearly ideal after Low Gap Creek entered in another two-thirds of a mile.

As usual there were a few deadfalls to avoid, but we never had to exit our boats. Though it had rained heavily that morning and 3.75 inches since Wednesday, the rain stopped while we were on the river and we enjoyed balmy weather in the 60's.

We only had one short swim, played like otters and enjoyed the excellent water quality and a most wonderful trip. Afterward Alex, Jay and I enjoyed a delicious feast at Ma Gooch's in Cleveland and planned our Sunday paddle.

Sunday, March 29

Warwoman Creek/Chattooga River — Earls Ford to Sandy Ford

Chattooga it challenged us a good deal at times.

There were many delightful Class 1 and 2 rapids and four Class 3-4's which definitely heightened our adrenaline levels, as did the powerful rapids on Section 3, including the Class 4 water at Dicks Creek Ledge and just upstream of Sandy Ford. We had a couple of rolls and one swim, but the recoveries were quick.

John Holley and friends were also paddling Warwoman this afternoon, and we saw many GCA friends on the Chattooga, including Tom and Suzanne Welander, Milt Aitkin, and David Asbell. Our wonderful trip and fellowship continued that evening with the addition of Tee Brower and the delicious food of La Pachanga's Mexican Restaurant in Clayton.
